# **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT** ne everyone to the 2022 college year. A special welco

Welcome everyone to the 2022 college year. A special welcome to our new students and their families. We have had a lovely start to the year with students excited to be at NCAT and working well together. It has been great to see happy faces and students so engaged in their learning.

Thankfully, there have been few COVID cases amongst students and these have not created any disruption. The school community is informed via emails daily or as required of any COVID positive cases.

We are experiencing some issues in covering classes in specialist areas when a teacher tests positive or is unwell as, unfortunately, there is a great shortage of casual relief teachers particularly in Technology. I have spoken to fellow Principals at other schools and this is a common problem.



### Year 10 Breakfast

We were delighted to welcome our new Year 10 students and their parents/carers for the traditional Year 10 Breakfast which launches the Year 10 Orientation program (pictured). Students and parents met the Year 10 Coordinators and heard from last year's Year 10 students, Nina McCarthy-Gray from Arts and Nick Bowler from Technology, who spoke about their experience starting at NCAT and gave students some sage advice. The day was a great success with students across the Arts and Technologies streams getting to know each other, their form teachers and Coordinators and their way around the college.

The various Orientation Programs organised for Years 11, 12 and tertiary students also went well as old and new students met each other and settled into the college.

### Building and equipment update

Over the holidays we spent over \$170,000 of locally raised funds on 80 new computers and 40 laptops for the Technology areas. Computers were replaced in 4 classrooms and the laptops will be used to supplement computers in the classroom and to provide extra flexibility in classroom delivery.

We are delighted that the college has had its submission for \$25,000 for shade sails from the *Shade Sails Fund* approved. The submission is to provide three large shade sails to support outdoor learning. The works are required to be completed by May.





#### **Staff Changes**

As a result of a number of staff taking leave, retiring and two teachers moving to other schools, we have a number of staff changes at Years 10-12. We warmly welcome **Kyra Hatzikosmidis**, the new English/VCAL Literacy teacher and Tutor, **Phoebe Witt**, the new Theatre Studies/English teacher, **Gemma Saunders** the new Photography and Screen and Media teacher, **Andrew James** the new Music teacher, **Andrew Coletti** the new Electro-technology teacher and **Robert Pergolizzi** the new Building & Construction teacher.

Whilst Ian McKey is on leave this year, his Careers Coordination duties have been taken up by **Nadia Tomarchio** who will look after the Arts students and **Sandra Vaina** who will look after the Technology/Pre-App students as well as all school based and Head Start apprenticeships.

There have been some staff leadership changes with **Natasha Stamos** taking over Year 10 Arts Coordination and **Darren Gunstone** Year 10 Technology Coordination. We hope this year, to run more activities that combine the Year 10s, Arts and Technology students. Unfortunately, this proved impossible in 2021 due to the various lockdowns.

#### Year 12 - 2021 success

I want to congratulate last year's Year 12 students. Almost all students who sought tertiary entry were accepted into the course they wanted with the majority getting their first or second preference. We have also had the largest contingent ever of our VCAL Pre-App students gaining an apprenticeship. Almost all of last year's Year 12 Pre-App students and more than 70% of our Year 11 Pre-App students gained apprenticeships – an amazing result! There currently seems to be a huge skills shortage in the construction industry and the trades.

Our completion rates for 2021 were VCE – 97%, VCAL 93%, VET 84% and the mean study score was 28.

A big congratulations to Jaden Lal who was awarded a \$5,000 Melbourne University Scholarship to study Fine Arts Dance at the Victorian College of the Arts. Jaden along with Alanah Douglas who scored a top score of 48 for VET Dance and Chloe Caffari, have been chosen to perform their VCE dance solos at the *Top Class* Dance Concert at the Melbourne Recital Centre as part of the VCE Season of Excellence. All students received an A+ for their Dance solos and were part of a record nine Dance students scoring A or A+ for VCE or VET Dance and asked to audition for *Top Class*.

Five students, Chloe and Charli Caffari, Bianca and Monique Hirschfield and Henry Thompson were asked to audition for Top Class Sound and Music with Henry Thompson being chosen to perform at the Top Class concert at the Melbourne Recital Centre. A big congratulations to all the students nominated and the students chosen for the VCE Season of Excellence – they should all be very proud of their achievement.

#### Literacy and Numeracy funding

We have been funded by DET for 0.4 Literacy and 0.6 Numeracy Student Support for 2022. This has meant we have been able to put two teachers in some classes to support students with their work.

### **School Council nominations**

We have three positions to fill on the College Council. The Council is a legal entity that oversees the key direction of the college. We already have two nominations from parents. ### 2022 School Improvement Priorities Goal and Key Improvement Strategies

While some of our students have thrived in the remote learning environment, others have maintained their learning progress, and some need extra learning and wellbeing support despite the best efforts of their teachers and families.

In 2022 we will continue to focus on student learning - with an increased focus on numeracy and student wellbeing through the 2022 Priorities Goal, a learning Key Improvement Strategy and a wellbeing Key Improvement Strategy. We will teach and support each student at their point of need and in line with FISO – the Framework for Improving Student Outcomes.

#### Key Improvement Strategies:

- 1. Learning Support both those who need extra support and those who have thrived to continue to extend their learning, especially in numeracy
- 2. Wellbeing Effectively mobilise available resources to support students' wellbeing and mental health, especially the most vulnerable

#### Child Safe

## DOES YOUR STUDENT HAVE A SERIOUS MEDICAL CONDITION?

## HOMEWORK

Students in Years 10-12 should be completing one to three hours of homework each weekday and up to six hours on weekends and during peak VCE times (DE&T Homework guidelines <u>www.education.vic.gov.au</u>). All VCE students should have a study timetable. VCAL students should also ensure that they keep up to date and revise work.

NCAT has a quiet study room (B13) available for students to use during study periods and before and after school until 5.00pm each day.

## **STUDENT MOBILE PHONES**

Once students arrive at the College, their mobile phone/smart watch must be switched off and placed in their locker until they leave for the day. Should a student need to contact a parent/carer they should go to the General Office or their coordinator to organise this contact.

## **STUDENT DROP OFFS & PICK-UPS**

We remind all students and parents/guardians that there are to be **NO** school drop offs or pick-ups on Murray Road or on College grounds i.e. at or across the Murray Rd driveway or pedestrian gates, in the Murray Rd visitors carpark or in the Sheila St driveway. # Unexplained Absences SMS Notifications & Compass

An automated SMS message is sent from Compass at 9:30am each day to advise Parents/Guardians if their student has been marked Not Present for Period 1. Notifications will only be sent when no explanation for the student absence has been entered in Compass prior to 9:30am.

Absence explanations can be entered by the Parent/Guardian directly into Compass or by contacting the General Office.

Please note, if a student arrives late to Period 1, but before 9:30am, the teacher makes every effort to remark the roll. However, it is not always possible due to the nature of the class or work being completed at the time. In this instance the automated text message will be sent as their status stays as Not Present until corrected by the teacher. The General Office can only verify class attendance with teachers during recess and lunch times.

Parents/Guardians are required to provide explanations for all student absences. To check if your student has any unexplained absences/lates you can log into Compass and there will be a message stating 'Attendance Note Required' in the My News section of the Homepage. The link 'Click here for more information' will show you unexplained absences but you can also select Summary to review attendance for all periods on any given date.

If you believe your student was in class please contact the class teacher via Compass email requesting that the records be corrected accordingly. If you believe the absence is due to a timetable error please contact the General Office. Do not enter an explanation if you believe your student was in class or it was a timetable issue, this will affect their attendance record.

# **Student Work Placements**

Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) for Pre-Apps and General VCAL and Work Experience for Year 10 will be from Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> June to Friday 24<sup>th</sup> June.

All paperwork must be returned to the General Office by Friday 29<sup>th</sup> April (1<sup>st</sup> Friday of Term 2).

## Required paperwork includes:

- Arrangement form; all employer, student and parent/guardian signatures must be completed, ready for the Principal to sign off.

- Additional COVID-19 form; this form is to be signed by student and parent/guardian.

- Travel & accommodation form\*\*; if the student will be travelling in a vehicle at any time during placement that is not with a parent/guardian or staying away from home.

- Working with animals form; this should be done before placement paperwork is signed off, see Nadia Tomarchio for a copy of form.

\*\*All 10T and Pre-App students **must** ensure the travel form is completed; the only exception is if a student is at 1 worksite for the full 2 weeks and will not be travelling with the employer at <u>any</u> time.

Please note that the Employer Guidelines must be provided to the employer when they are signing your paperwork.

For Year 11 & 12 students a completed two-week Structured Workplace Learning placement in your VET subject area will form part of your assessment and give you 1 credit towards completion of your VCAL. A Work Experience placement, which is not in your area of interest, will not provide a credit.

# **Introducing NCAT Careers Team & Career Development Program**

CAREERS CORNER: BRINGING YOU REGULAR CAREER UPDATES

Northern College of Arts and Technology has a dedicated Careers team to support students as they explore their career pathways. As Ian McKey is on long service leave, this year **Nada Tomarchio** (Art Careers) and **Sandra Vaina** (Technology Careers) are working in partnership to deliver the career development program.

The program requires students to participate in tasks and activities that support their careers and pathway options.

This Term our Year 10-12 students are working on their Career Action Plans. This plan helps them set their vocational and academic goals. It also assists to clarify the actions needed to achieve their career aspirations. These plans are given to the VCAL students during either their Work Related Skills (WRS) or Personal Development Skills (PDS) classes. The VCE students completed them during orientation day and the Year 10 Students will work on them in their ROCKS classes.

The careers team are also available to support students with their CAPs and in preparing students for their work experience (Year 10) and work placements programs (Year 11 and 12). Throughout the course of the year our VCAL student's participate in careers related tasks during their WRS or PDS classes to support them with their CAPs or answering questions around work experiences.

In Term 2, the Pre-App students are required to participate in the Structured Work Learning (SWL) Placement and the Year 10 and General VCAL students in Work Experience. Some VCAL students may be required to complete a Structured Work placement as part of their VET program. Additional information on Work Experience and SWL is included in this newsletter and will also be on COMPASS.

Term 3 is dedicated to many of our Year 12 students who are looking to explore Apprenticeships, diploma or degree courses at a University or TAFE. The Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre opens for students' application during the month of August, students will be involved in a presentation closer to the date about how to begin the process.

Term 4 prepares our students for their next step outside of NCAT. There will be sessions with information on how best we can support them in the next exciting stage of their lives. In addition the VCAL students will be participating in the Real Industry Jobs Interview (RIJI) program to assist them to become work ready.

Our career office is situated in the administration area and our door is always open for a career conversation. Students are encouraged to make an appointment to discuss their careers needs. We look forward to meeting you and hearing about your career goals, and we are here to help you. Best of luck as with your work experience search we hope that it is an enjoyable part of your schooling at NCAT this year.

On Friday 11<sup>th</sup> February, 47 nervous new Art Immersion students headed into the city to attend the NGV Australia exhibition *We Change the World*. The exhibition explores the impact that artists can have as environmental activists, political and social protestors and designers of new technology and ways of living.

Students then had a chance to explore the exhibition independently in order to take notes for an exhibition review/ opinion piece they would write back at school on the topic: Art can change the world.

After lunch we lounged in the sun in the sculpture garden at NGV International, checking out the architectural commission Pond(er), working up our essay notes and generally getting to know each other. A lovely day!

# SCHOOL COUNCIL ELECTIONS 2022 INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

### What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally formed bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within centrally provided guidelines. The functions of a school council are specified in the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006* and include:

- establishing the broad direction and vision of the school within the school's community
- participating in the development and monitoring of the school strategic plan
- approving the annual budget and monitoring expenditure
- developing, reviewing and updating school policies
- raising funds for school-related purposes
- maintaining the school's grounds and buildings
- entering into contracts (such as for cleaning or construction work)
- reporting annually to the school community and to the Department
- creating interest in the school in the wider community
- informing itself of and taking into account the views of the community
- regulating and facilitating the after-hours use of school premises and grounds
- making provision for a preschool program at the school or other premises controlled by the Minister.

### Who is on the school council?

There are three categories of membership:

- $\Rightarrow$  A mandated elected Parent category. More than one third of the total members must be from this category.
- ⇒ A mandated elected Department of Education & Training (DET) employee category. Members of this category may make up no more than one third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- ⇒ Community member category. Its members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences.

The term of office for all members is two years. Half the members must retire each year in March, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections. Of course, members can stand again if they wish and their children are still at NCAT.

### Why is Parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school. Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying in itself and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

### Do I need special experience to be on school council?

No. What you do need is an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future. New members undergo an induction and also have access to training provided by the Department of Education.

### How often does the School Council meet?

The NCAT College Council meets a minimum of 8 times per year, twice per term, on a Wednesday evening. Dinner is provided at 6pm and the meeting starts at 7pm and runs to 8.30-9pm.

### What do you need to do to if you wish to stand for election?

There is a nomination form included as part of this newsletter. Fill it in and send it to the college by 4pm on 12<sup>th</sup> March. You can email it to <u>ncat@education.vic.gov.au</u>, or you can fax it to 9471 0929 or you can post it or send with your son or daughter.

If there are more nominations received than there are vacancies on council, a ballot will be conducted during the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.
